A Note From the ESQG Vice-President

I recently read a book titled *The Painter*, that had an interesting description of what an artist actually goes through in the process of creating a finished product, be it writing a book, painting a picture, sculpting, or even quilting. I would like to share this with all of you in light of the fact that people often ask us to "make a quilt" for them and then balk at the price of something "made from scraps."

Nobody, not even artists, understands art. How much work it takes, year after year, building the skills, the trust in the process... because it is 24 hours a day, even in dreams. The best work usually takes the least effort. Sometimes it comes on fast; it comes without thought. Sometimes it takes time, and the work is agony. Pieces are put together, torn apart, rebuilt. There is doubt in everything that is learned. But, through this, if you survive the halting pace and fever, sometimes you make the best work you have ever made. That is the part that none of us understand.

Do not be embarrassed when a project takes longer than expected. Do not be afraid to tell someone that what they are asking you to do will take time. Do not charge less just because you can create that project in "a jiffy." You have spent countless hours learning your skill, attending workshops, drawing designs. You have spent hundreds if not thousands of dollars for your supplies, tools and equipment. They need to respect that, because whether you admit it or not, YOU are an ARTIST. Even if you have always followed a pattern or copied from your neighbor, the fact that you chose your own colors, and added an extra border, says to everyone else, "I designed this quilt. I have made it my own."

Be proud of your accomplishments and do not let people take advantage of your skills. You worked hard for those skills. You are allowed to take as much time or as little time as you need to create your quilt as you see fit. *Speed has nothing to do with art.* Use your skills and your creativity to make each quilt a part of you. For the amount of work you put into a quilt, you deserve the respect of the recipient. It is not a pile of scraps sewn together. It is years of crafting, learning, fine-tuning, tears of joy, tears of frustration all sewn together in this one, beautiful, quilted work of art.


