

Below is a letter received by Sharon Kubich:

Madam President,

I am the daughter of Edna Palombo of Belvidere, a former member of your quilt guild (early 2000's). My mom learned quilting with your quilt guild members in her retirement, and put to use her lifelong sewing skills. She often commented to me that she did not know how to put together all the squares she made and 'won" at quilt guild meetings. At her passing last year, I collected as many of her quilting treasures and squares, with the intent that I would eventually put her squares together and gift them to family. I've attached the Flower Basket Blocks that started this project — as there were 12 pastel blocks in all the squares I had from her. And, she has only two Great Grand-daughters who would be the recipients of these "pastel" squares. A fun project that kept me busy during the COVID "lockdown" this spring. A major learning experience for me, as a working full time nurse, I did not have time to tackle anything this big. But in retirement, I am enjoying learning how to put my sewing skills to another use.

I am honored to be the recipient of a Quilt of Valor fashioned by the Eastern Star Quilting group today on Veterans Day. The craftsmanship is outstanding and I'm sure many hours of planning and coordination went into its completion. When I was made aware of this honor I was unable to contemplate how I could possibly use another Quilt.

Now that I have read the accompanying article that explains its purpose; and placed the quilt in my family room draped over a large sofa I can better appreciate the beauty as well as the function it will provide when I need to ward off the chill... or the Viet Nam

When I read the article about the Blue Star Mom who started the Quilt of Valor Foundation it touched my heart and memories of the worst day for me in Viet Nam. Our LZ had been over run and we lost 18 guys. In the morning It was Mothers Day and I knew that Moms' would be getting someone standing on their doorstep with terrible bad news instead of flowers from their son. And every Mothers Day thereafter would be remembered as a time of heartbreak; in addition to the individual memory of losing a son on that date halfway across the world.

The personalization on the reverse side of the quilt brought a pleasant memory and a smile to my face. Marges' Mom was an Eastern Star member and I could picture her smile and chattering as if she were among a group doing similar activities.

I see that the Quilts of Valor was started by a Blue Star Mom. I have a friend who is a Gold Star Mom and when I learned her Blue Star Moms group were organizing a tricky tray I was able to participate. Blue Star Moms are one of my most satisfying organizations to donate to; as both time and funds get directly to the military families.

Thank you again for all you do for Veterans; I am honored to be a part of your 'quilting
