A Note From the ESQG Vice-President

Greetings and Happy New Year to all of you! I was raised with the idea that whatever we did on New Year's Eve would influence what we experienced during the New Year. One year my sister came to visit for New Year's, and we ended up getting together more times that year than ever before or since. One year, I had a bad cold on New Year's Eve and suffered several bad colds that year. Last year, I made sure I was sewing all day and hand quilting in my big comfy chair at midnight and don't you know it... I finished five hand-quilted quilts and numerous other projects during 2020. My husband told me not to do that again, because I caused Covid in order to do my hand quilting... perspectives, dear. Regardless, I made sure I was hand quilting at midnight again this year!

My project of choice to start the new year is a lap size hexagon quilt top, which I inherited from a friend about 20 years ago along with two other quilt tops. She purchased them for \$1 each at a garage sale years before and decided she no longer wanted them I was happy to take them off her hands, but had so many other projects to do and kids to raise that they sat in the box in the closet for years. Those quilts never left my thoughts completely, and finally last month I decided to drag them out again to see if they were up for the challenge of 2021. Jayne Bodolsky (my favorite local quilt historian!) helped me date the quilt top to about 1910 to 1920 with a few pieces from earlier years stitched in How wonderful to be working on a quilt top that is truly over 100 years old! The fabric is so soft and easy to stitch, and again I think of that unknown quilter so many years ago and wonder what her intentions were with her new quilt. I hope to do her quilt justice, and give her the satisfaction of having it finished.

Like our Postage Stamp Block this month, my hexagon quilt is considered "one patch" quilt. Historically recognized as a "charm quilt" or "Beggars Quilt," both of these designs were theoretically intended to contain no duplication of fabrics within the quilt top. Realistically, however, few quilts have *no* duplications. Many have two or more and are still considered Charm Quilts. My hexagon quilt top has several duplicated fabrics of indigo blues, shirtings, and mustard yellows, so I believe it was made more out of necessity than not. Regardless, I intend to continue quilting it in the evenings in my big, comfy chair and pray for good health and full bobbins for everyone!

May the New Year bring good things to all of us! See you on Tuesday, January 12th!

JANUARY BLOCK OF THE MONTH GOES POSTAL

The January Block of the Month is a 10" square Postage Stamp block. The Postage Stamp quilt started in the 1930's when competitive quilting started in the county fairs and festivals. Women tried to think of something new and challenging to out-do their competitors, and a quilt of thousands of 1" squares was born! They are amazing traditional style quilts and can be assembled with or without sashing. Most of us have plenty of fabrics to choose from, and if you have been quilting any length of time, you may have a collection of scraps or even 1-1/2" strips or squares. Lynette Jensen and Bonnie Hunter patterns love the 1" squares, so followers of these two designers should have no problem finding scraps. Technically, each square should be different, but if you are new to quilting and do



not have 100 fabrics to choose from, do the best you can mixing up what you have to work with. As a reminder, anyone in the guild can participate in this one. It does not use the background fabric distributed by the guild. Also, be sure to notify Cindy Smith (numbers3.cs@gmail.com or text to 908-310-2466) when you complete your block IF you want to be included in the drawing. A SOCIALLY DISTANCED HOLIDAY SOCIAL



UPDATE ON OLIVER AND THE DISCOVERY OF PEEK AND BOO!

Last month we reported our findings of Oliver, a Red Morph Eastern Screech Owl. Shortly thereafter, one of our local nature photographers got wind of little Oliver, and suddenly he was on social media! His photo has been posted twice already, and we are happy to have a picture of him to share. Oliver continues to guard his home. Most mornings he is sleeping when we pass, most afternoons he follows us as we walk by with our dogs in tow. Occasionally, Oliver is not at home and we worry like any good parents would, but usually by the next day, he is back in his tree, same hole, same tree, (nearly) every day. He is just adorable!

Funny enough, a month after we discovered Oliver, we also came upon two bears hibernating near the base of a large tree on the opposite side of the stream about a half mile down the road. When we saw them three days in a row in the same spot, we were concerned that maybe they were in distress. We called Fish & Game and learned that although it is unusual to us, it is not unusual for bears to hibernate at the base of a large tree out in the open, out in the elements all winter. We still thought it was strange for them to be so close to a roadway. Each day as we walked the dogs, both morning and afternoon, they would pop up and watch us; never leaving their tree. Once we learned they might be there awhile, we aptly named them Peek and Boo. Each time we passed, Mama bear watched us from one side and her yearling watched us from the other. After a week of greeting them quietly each day, they were gone. Perhaps we were too much for them, perhaps they did not appreciate their new names, perhaps they found a better and quieter place to spend the winter. Have a good rest Peek and Boo! Perhaps we will see you again in the spring!
