

A Note From the ESQG Vice-President

It's September again and autumn is just around the corner. I reminisce over childhood years of past Septembers. I used to relish the excitement of starting new school years, seeing old friends again, wearing new school clothes that I made or my mother made for me, and just doing things again. This September offers very little of those things for most of us. We continue to be home, social-distancing ourselves, wearing our homemade masks, and trying to maintain some type of normal in our lives. I find that I turn to my quilting for comfort time and time again, and this summer was no different.

In early July when our family reunion was cancelled, I picked up my great grandmother's quilt top, hand-pieced in the 1950's, and I began hand quilting it. I faithfully worked on it every evening for about four hours or so and enjoyed the time I spent with my great grandmother. I only knew her when I was very little, so the memories are few and dim, but it does not change how I think of her each evening and wonder what her plans were for this top that was never completed. Am I doing it justice? Are my stitches acceptable? Is she pleased that I am finishing it? I will never know... yet I continue to stitch it a little every day and think of her every time I pick it up. It brings me comfort to spend time with her now more than ever, and I wish that I had known her better. I love that we have this connection even though we are three generations apart and she is no longer walking this earth. This thought makes me look at some of my own quilts. I completed a whole-cloth quilt this summer as well... something I have been working on for several years. Will my children want this quilt? It's hand-quilted, yes; but there is no color. It's dull and lifeless. Will they sell it in a garage sale thinking that it was some fancy mattress pad? I will never know.

I turn to my fabrics and think about Janelea MacBeth's lecture in February this year. "You have scraps. We all do. Use them!" So I did. I began creating a string quilt, made with strips of fabric of different widths, of different colors, of different lifetimes. There were scraps from some of my first quilts, and scraps from quilts I just finished. There were scraps from my mom's stash, and scraps from my daughter's stash. So many strips! I loved making this quilt and I loved spending time with all the people for whom I made the quilts that created the scraps that were now creating a new quilt. My daughter refers to this string quilt as my "scrapbook quilt." What a great name for it and what a great concept. It truly is a scrapbook of my quilting life over the past 30 years. A true gem... a "keeper" for me. Creating this scrappy quilt gave me comfort during this pandemic, and hopefully the finished quilt will bring comfort to my family for years to come. Quilts live on even when we do not. Maybe not in the next generation, maybe not in two generations, but it will surface again. Somewhere down the road, I may have a great-granddaughter who will think of me as she finishes a quilt top that I might leave undone, and she will also wonder what I was like and what I had in mind when I started that project.

Quilting gives us comfort no matter the generation, no matter the reason. Our quilts will live on long after we do and continue to bring comfort to our family and friends.

The finished lap-sized quilt measures 54" x 72". An optional size will be offered at 72" x 72" if preferred. 2020 Raffle Quilt Postponed

This poor blue and yellow quilt has had such a hard life...first it was supposed to be our 2019 Raffle Quilt, but we hit a snag with the assembly. Then it emerged from the ashes and was destined to be our 2020 Raffle Quilt. Now, we believe we must hold onto it a little while longer. Due to our crazy Covid19 year, without the ability to meet people face to face, the board opted to hold the quilt until December 2021. Generally, most of our sales are generated by the Warren County Fair and Victorian Days events. With both of these events cancelled this year, it puts the entire burden on the guild members to sell the tickets. Since we cannot go out to group events, or to our workplace, or to major family events, it would be a great burden to all of us to try to sell all of the tickets. Further consideration was given to the fact that we do not know when the social distancing and group gathering limitations will be lifted, so it might be too late into 2021 to create a new quilt for next winter's drawing. The board considered all of these drawbacks and decided to delay the raffle of the blue and yellow Crossroads quilt to December 2021. On the bright side, it is completed, quilted and bound and ready for next year's raffle!

A New Twist on the Block of the Month

A suggestion was made to renew our Block of the Month program. If someone would like to volunteer to choose the patterns and colors for this year's Block of the Month, Cindy Smith has offered to run the drawing of the participants to announce the monthly winner. The monthly pattern will be sent via email to the member distribution list. Participants will notify the chairperson that they made a block for that month, and a drawing will be held from that group of names. The winner of the Block of the Month will be announced in an email, so everyone who made a block can mail their block directly to the winner. Imagine receiving 25 or 30 pieces of mail containing quilt blocks! Keep in mind we will be sending the patterns out via email, so be sure you adhere to copyright issues on the patterns you submit. More than one person could offer a pattern, or we could have months here and there with no pattern. It's up to you! This is your guild!

Members had until June 2020 to complete their projects, which was extended to September 8th. 
